

Kære alle sammen,

Vi er samlet her i dag, fordi mennesker på flugt i Danmark bliver behandlet som kriminelle – som om de ikke har rettigheder.

Og lad os være helt klare:

Det her er ikke en systemfejl.

Det her er ikke "kompliceret jura".

Det her er ikke noget, der bare er sket.

Det her er et politisk valg.

Valgt af politikere, der har stemt for lovene.

Administreret af et embedsværk, der udfører dem.

Og normaliseret i en offentlighed, der har vænnet sig til umenneskelighed.

Og ja – det er også vores ansvar,

hvis vi tier stille.

Danmark elsker at kalde sig et retssamfund.

Et humant land.

Et land med værdier.

Men lad os kigge på virkeligheden:

I Danmark fængsler vi mennesker uden dom.

I Danmark kalder vi mennesker på flugt for "kriminelle",
før de overhovedet har gjort noget.

I Danmark bygger vi udrejsecentre, hegn og meldepligt –
og kalder det "nødvendig politik".

Hvis det her er humanisme –

hvad er så umenneskelighed?

Jeg kom selv til Danmark som flygtning.

Til et Danmark, der tog imod mennesker som mennesker.

Ikke som mistænkte.

Ikke som problemer.

Men som mennesker med rettigheder.

Det Danmark findes.

Men lige nu er det ved at blive kørt over af et andet Danmark.

Et Danmark, der styrer med frygt.

Et Danmark, der har gjort midlertidighed til en livsdom.

Et Danmark, der har gjort utryghed til en metode.

Vi ved, hvad der sker.

Vi ved, hvordan børn vokser op bag hegn.

Vi ved, at mennesker holdes fast i et hjemrejsesystem,
der i praksis kriminaliserer dem for at være på flugt.

Vi ved, at menneskerettigheder bliver bøjet –
og nogle vil helt ud af dem.

Vi kan ikke sige, vi ikke vidste det.
Og når man ved – så har man et ansvar.

Vi deler samfund med mennesker på flugt.
Men vi nægter dem den samme fremtid.
Det er ikke en naturlov.
Det er et valg.

Og valg kan laves om.

Men kun hvis vi nægter at normalisere umenneskelighed.
Kun hvis vi nægter at lade frygt definere,
hvem der har ret til rettigheder.
Kun hvis vi står her – og står fast.

Derfor er vi her i dag.
For at sige det højt, så ingen kan lade som om, de ikke hørte det:

Nok er nok.

Tak fordi I står her.
Tak fordi I nægter at tie.

Dear everyone,

We are gathered here today because people seeking refuge in Denmark are being treated like criminals,
as if they have no rights.

And let us be absolutely clear:
This is not a system error.
This is not “complicated legislation.”
This is not something that just happened.
This is a political choice.

A choice made by politicians who voted for these laws.
Implemented by an administration that enforces them.
And normalized by a public that has grown accustomed to inhumanity.
And yes, it is also our responsibility
if we remain silent.

Denmark likes to call itself a state governed by the rule of law.
A humane country.
A country with values.
But let us look at the reality:
In Denmark, we detain people without a conviction.
In Denmark, people seeking refuge are labeled “criminals”
before they have done anything wrong.
In Denmark, we build deportation centers, fences, and reporting obligations
and call it “necessary policy.”

If this is humanism,
then what is inhumanity?

I myself came to Denmark as a refugee.
To a Denmark that received people as people.
Not as suspects.
Not as problems.
But as people with rights.

That Denmark exists.
But right now, it is being run over by another Denmark.
A Denmark governed by fear.
A Denmark that has turned temporariness into a life sentence.
A Denmark that has turned insecurity into a method.

We know what is happening.
We know how children grow up behind fences.
We know that people are trapped in a return system
that, in practice, criminalizes them for being on the run.
We know that human rights are being bent,
and some want to abandon them altogether.

We cannot say we did not know.
And when you know, you have a responsibility.

We share a society with people seeking refuge.
But we deny them the same future.
That is not a law of nature.
It is a choice.
And choices can be changed.

But only if we refuse to normalize inhumanity.
Only if we refuse to let fear decide
who gets to have rights.
Only if we stand here and stand firm.

That is why we are here today.
To say it out loud, so no one can pretend they did not hear it:

Enough is enough.

Thank you for being here.
Thank you for refusing to stay silent.
